- Funding Agency: USDA Natural Resources and Conservation Service
- Total Funding: \$22M divided into two pools
 - Pool 1: \$14M available for 3-4-year projects between \$350k and \$1M
 - Pool 2: \$8M available for 1-2-year projects between \$100k and \$300k
- No Match Required
- Indirect Recovery
 - Limited to 10% for non-profits and institutions of higher ed
 - Other types of applicants can use their NICRA
- Eligible Applicants: tribal gov'ts and organizations, nonprofits, farmer & rancher organizations, state and local agencies, land grant universities
- Applications due May 26, 2024, by 11:59 PM ET
- Notifications made by June 25 and agreements executed by September 30

NFO HIGHLIGHTS





ELIGIBLE ACTIVITIES

Strong proposals will focus on the following types of activities:

- Technical assistance
 - Write and implement grazing plans
 - Demonstrate innovation and grazing technologies
- Education (Conferences, workshops, webinars, and other educational events)
- Grazing networks (field days, pasture walks, peer-to-peer knowledge exchange, mentorship)
- NRCS Workforce Development, including mentorship, training, and apprenticeship arrangements
- Youth outreach related to grazing land management may be included to supplement producer outreach.
- **A limited amount of funds in each region may be used to conduct on-farm research as a supplemental goal for any projects conducting the above activities.



NRCS PRIORITIY AREAS

Proposals must address one or more of the following priority areas:

- Addressing local natural resource concerns.
- Utilizing Climate Smart Agriculture and Forestry practices and principles.
- Encouraging existing and new partnerships to advance the resource needs of underserved communities.
- Identifying and implementing innovative strategies to quantify, monitor, report on and verify conservation benefits associated with grazing management systems.
- Utilizing Indigenous Traditional Ecological Knowledge (ITEK), where applicable.



NRCS EVALUATION PRIORITIES

NRCS will place priority upon projects that:

- Promote grazing management systems.
- Have a long-term project plan for funding beyond the life of this award.
- Are led by organizations serving primarily historically underserved producers or tribal governments and organizations
- Include multi-stakeholder partnerships of three or more organizations.
- Have significant farmer and rancher involvement.
- Have strategies to quantify, monitor, report on and verify conservation benefits.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

- Submission through Grants.gov don't wait to set up an account and familiarize yourself with the platform! Give yourself plenty of time to submit.
- Application Requirements:
 - Project Title & Summary
 - Project Narrative (≤15 pgs. of text, ≤ 5 pgs. of figures and tables)
 - Background on your organization and any partners (incl. key personnel and at least one partner)
 - Workplan (incl. goal and objectives, timeline with milestones, indicators/metrics, and evaluation)
 - SF-424A (budget, entered directly into form on Grants.gov)*
 - Budget Narrative*
 - Other forms: Lobbying, Applicant Contact Info, Statement of Support (optional templates provided), NICRA (if applicable), Conflict of Interest (if applicable)
 - SAM Registration and UEI Number begin this process ASAP if you are doing it for the first time

*NRCS has helpful guidance and examples of what these look like



APPLICATION REVIEW

- Applications will first be screened for completeness and compliance, read the NFO carefully!
- Applications will then go through a merit/technical review, which will focus on*
 - Project consistency with GLCI purpose and priorities
 - Organizational support and partnerships
 - Project workplan
 - Budget
- Once notice of selection for funding is made, a final administrative and risk review will take place
